"TALE OF THE TRUNK" EDUCATION CENTER ACQUISITION... ANOTHER PIECE OF HISTORY

A fantastic piece of Cambridge Glass Company history has been moved into the Edna McManus Shepard Education Center at the museum.

During auction weekend, several members asked how it was acquired and the story behind its arrival at the museum. We all love a story, so here it is.....

One summer day two years ago, a call came into the museum from a man who claimed he had a large trunk that had belonged to The Cambridge Glass

Company. We had our doubts, but Carl Beynon and I jumped in his van with directions in hand and set off into the Guernsey County outback. I still have no idea where we went!

After making several wrong turns at "the bend in the road", we finally arrived at the house. The man greeted us and led us to a shed to

show us his treasure. Sitting in a dark corner was a dirty, mold covered trunk calling out to us. However, the inscription "Cambridge Glass Co.,



Cambridge OH #7" was still faintly visible on both sides of the trunk. He said that he had recovered it while cleaning out a flooded basement in Cambridge and wanted \$75 for it.....SOLD! As we were loading it in the van, I could tell that Carl was wondering what we had gotten ourselves into this time. An effort was then made to find someone to restore

the trunk with no success, so it spent the next year and a half in the NCC storage building.

Another stroke of luck......last fall we discovered that Sandi Rohrbough, one of our museum employees, had experience in trunk restoration. The trunk was moved to Sandi's house for the winter. She spent many, many days diligently working on it and the results are outstanding! Thank you Sandi!

The trunk was moved to the museum during auction weekend for members to see and Willard Kolb confirmed its authenticity. The trunk was used by The Cambridge Glass Company to ship glassware to trade shows for salesmen to use in their displays. Willard also said the many other glass companies used similar trunks. Just imagine the many pieces of Cambridge Glass that traveled the country in this trunk. What a great piece of history!


Dennis Snyder

Dear NCC.

This has no chips or cracks....perfect condition. I believe it is a temple jar but the pattern is unknown to me. I am hoping you can help me and also provide the rarity/valuation of this item.

Janice,

Your Temple Jar has an etching that is only know as E725; it is typically found on candy boxes, bowls and vases. Nice to know you can find it on Temple Jars too. The color is Peach-Blo and was from the 1930's (probably early in the 30's). Temple Jars are not a common item to find, and in Peach-Blo it is a very nice find. I would not call it "Rare," but definitely "Hard-to-find." The NCC cannot offer a valuation of your glass, due to IRS regulations on Nonprofits. One thing that will affect value is the etching. Although it is nice, it is not a highly sought-after etching. Had it been Cleo, Apple Blossom or Gloria (all produced in that time frame) it would be higher in value. Thank you for sharing it with us.



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
