

## Patterns

MEARCUT DESIGN #2653\*

This month, another interesting and beautiful Cambridge Glass Company pattern, called simply DESIGN 2653.

The overall design consists of large squares covering the body of the piece except for a deep plain rim. The rim is scalloped on some pieces and plain on others. The squares are staggered around the body in horizontal rows making them appear spirally or diagonally. Each square has high bevelled sides with corners sliced off and concaved. The top of the square carries an octagonal star; all stars are alike. Note in the photo, the interesting handles on the ice cream tray and the celery tray.

The pattern was made in creamer, sugar, covered cracker jar, celery tray, ice-cream tray and square saucer, tumbler, goblet, custard cup, footed sherbet, jelly compote, punch bowl, two-handled celery vase, quart and two quart tankard pitchers (the two-quart pitcher was made with applied handle), four-piece table set, several flat bowls, carage, cruet, and open salt.

Made in the early 1900's.

The stickers gave the production dates for these sachet bottles. The two dates were March 15, 1946 and April 14 and 15, 1946.

I understand that some nice Cambridge items were found at a recent Columbus show. A Windsor Blue Nude Comport found a new home near Newark. I understand that only five or six of these comports are known to exist at the present. Do any of you lucky people out there own one of these and you are holding out on us? A five and one-half inch Carmen swan and a Carmen, ring stem, Ivy ball have been keeping company with an eight and one-half inch crystal with satin finish, draped lady figure flower frog at a home in Columbus since that recent show.

A few items have surfaced in Azuritethe large rectangular cigarette box and two of the Azurite plates trimmed in gold.

I recently attended an auction where there was a plentiful supply of Cambridge milk glass.

The other items that have been found recently have been not one but two eight and one-half inch moonlight draped lady figure flower frogs, a Dresden Lady in milk glass, two Dresden Ladies, a crystal cracker jar and feather, crystal water tumblers and I thought the Cambridge Show was over!

Are all of you getting ready for the first all Cambridge Auction? Now is the time to get rid of that exura piece of Carmen, Cut Wild Rose and Moonlight Caprice. This will probably be the place to get that extra Rosepoint bowl, that Moonlight Caprice stemware and I'll have to heaven knows what else. put my ear to the ground and find out what sort of goodies will show up in the Auction and I'll let you know next month. I would assume that quite a few of the top Cambriage glass buyers will be at the auction. By top buyers, I mean all of those people that are members of the Cambridge Collectors. Start saving your money for the auction.
