The Ohio History Connection/Ohio Historical Society hosted a very popular event held Statewide September 6 -15.

Visitors had the chance to tour all four floors of this historic building, all the while hearing the interesting history of the library itself, including the construction of the Carnegie building that began in 1903. **Cambridge Main Street** had the underground space, located at 653 Wheeling Avenue, open and available for viewing with an opportunity to learn about the history of the space and other general history. The **Cambridge Performing Arts Center** was also open for viewing. It was a rewarding day!

By the time you arrive in Cambridge for the Fall Membership Meeting in October, the Museum Dining Room will be transformed from this year's Heatherbloom to Crown Tuscan with Rockwell sterling. Minutes of the June 28, 2024 Annual Meeting

President Freeman Moore called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm at Pritchard Laughlin Civic Center and on Zoom. Freeman welcomed all our first time attendees! Frank and Vicki Wollenhaupt and Joy McFadden were recognized as attending for all 51 years!

Secretary report: Christine Smith

The minutes for March 2024 meeting were published in the Crystal Ball for review. Frank Wollenhaupt made a motion to accept the minutes as printed. Bev Accord seconded the motion. Motion passes with all ayes.

Treasurer report: Mike Strebler

Mike reported that NCC has over \$2 million in assets between property, investments, and accounts.

NCC finances itself with the annual fund, various programs, museum gift shop, and collector events such as Glass show and Glass Dash. We had surplus funds of about \$40,000 last year! Thank you to the generosity of this membership. We are projecting this year's surplus to be about half of this due to not having the property rented out and funds needed to update the website and the databases. The board decides when and how much of the surplus funds get moved to the Endowment Fund.

Committee Reports

Endowment Committee - Doug Ingraham

The Endowment Fund closed at \$1.18 million today compared to \$1.071 million at the end of 2023. Per the state of Ohio the current prudent withdraw from Endowment would be \$45,000 per year. This is calculated by using the average balance for the last 12 quarters and taking 5% of that amount.

The Endowment Fund needs to grow to be able to run the organization if needed. Currently NCC is a huge volunteer organization; so less individuals need to be hired. The Endowment Fund ensures funds are available to sustain this organization as needed to cover any income shortages. Thank you for all the time and the money you give to the organization.

Finance Committee - Mike Strebler

The day to day oversight of operations is handled by Larry Everett, VP of Administration. Our Business Manager, Lisa Nielson, pays the bills and takes care of transactions. Thank you for all the work in managing the organization.

The Finance Committee meets most months to review the monthly finances. The Finance committee has 9 members. Some members are on the board and some not.

Digital Strategy Committee and **Digital Preservation Committee** – Larry Everett

We are working on the NCC websites and calling in some experts to assist to resolve the domain name registration issues. Thank you to Susan Everett and Lisa Nielson for your support..

Larry reported NCC will no longer need to pay workers comp on federal level; only the state level.

Larry was thanked for all of his hard work on the many projects he has worked on for NCC as he steps off the board of directors.

Strategic Planning Committee – Doug Ingraham

The committee has been meeting a couple of times a month. We are looking at what this organization will look like in 5, 10, 15 years, etc. A tentative mission and vision statement has been created. After the committee completes his review, it will be sent to the board for discussion. Some work has been done on developing goals, and needs a much more review and we will update you at the fall meeting.

Membership Committee - Elaine Thompson.

The committee has 8 members and meets ten times per year virtually. Our main goal is to work on retention and recruitment of membership. Our big project this past year was to champion the amending the constitution so that members who are unable to attend the Annual Meeting can still vote. This is an action under New Business below.

Other initiatives include hand written notes sent to all new members to welcome them. A member spotlight was created and published monthly in the Crystal Ball. Let Elaine know if you would like to be included in member spotlight.

Operational VP Reports

Administration – Larry Everett No report at this time.

Development – Julie Buffenbarger

Julie gave a big "Thank You" for all attending convention! The Mini-Auction brought \$760. The 50/50 brought \$322. \$1,082 was raised for the endowment fund. Thank you for all who participated!

Julie also shared a thank you to all who assisted with the March auction, including Lynn Welker, Will and Bev Accord, Larry Everett, Lindy Thaxton, and Ken and Jane Filippini.

We are in need of a grant writer! Training is provided by attending a few courses through the State of Ohio. Reach out

to Julie if willing to fulfill this role!

Glass show report: Jack Thompson. The sponsor for the glass show this year was Mosser Glass. Thank you to Mosser!

Glass dash: Will start on Saturday at 7 am for early bird admission. See you there!

Museum - Cindy Arent

Freeman started by thanking Cindy for everything she and her team at the museum do for NCC. Cindy reported on the major areas of museum operation. 1. Entire interior is cleaned by volunteers. 2. Outside must be landscaped and cleaned. 3. Parking lot cleaned and fixed as needed. 4. The drains on the roof must be cleared of leaves and debris to avoid water issues.. Thank you to Jeff Ross for doing this! 5. Collection and displays. Inventory and cleaning must be done. Pieces need to be rotated so visitors can see everything..

Cindy commented on what's new for this year. The dining room will feature Heatherbloom and an updated bar ware display. Our marketing and advertising efforts are supported by a \$5000 grant from Visitors and Convention Bureau. It will be used for advertising including a commercial and holiday rack cards, We also did a two month sponsored boost on the Facebook page. Thank you for Jonathan Fuhrman for managing the page. The museum website is also updated. In the Gift shop, gift bags with cup/saucer and luncheon sets. Jewelry and ornaments are made from Cambridge glass pieces and sold. Community relationships and partnerships include an Etiquette program and Dickens Victorian village. Thank you for all your support, donations, and kind words!

Unfinished Old Business:

This year's nominating committee consisted of Nancy Finley, Elaine Thompson (chair), and Freeman Moore. The membership approved the slate of 4 candidates at the March membership meeting. Ballots were sent to all voting members, with a return rate of approximately 65%. The candidates were: Cindy Arent, Les Hansen, Marilyn Keck and Mike Strebler. Elected: Cindy Arent, Les Hansen, and Mike Strebler. Marilyn Keck received enough votes to be the First Alternate.

New Business:

Proposed Constitution Change: This proposal expands from those present at the annual meeting to approve changes to the constitution, to include voting by all members. In the current constitution, only members attending the annual meeting can vote.

Kathie Young made a motion to approve the proposal as printed in the Crystal Ball. Jeannie Moore seconded the motion. Discussion was held on how this proposal would be implemented. A number of suggestions were made to implement. For example, to be part of annual fund ballot or digitally or emailed or proxy votes or participating on zoom. A Governance committee has been created to decide the implementation details if the proposal is approved.

A call for vote was conducted. Nay 1 member. Remaining members voted yea. No abstains. Motion passes.

Adjournment:

Frank Wollenhaupt made a motion to adjourn. Jeannie Moore seconded the motion. Meeting adjourned.

Some New Fancy Items in the Cambridge Glass Lines

Among the new acquisitions augumenting the extensive lines of the Cambridge Glass Co., Alex Menzies, manager of the New York office at 184 Fifth Ave., is displaying a variety of new things. Among them is included party lunch sets, with oval plate, high and low-footed sherberts. ice-tea tumblers in crystal and gold decorations and in transparent colors of aurora blue, amber, amethyst, topaz and mulberry. In boudoir sets a new arrival includes an oval handled tray, covered jug and tumbler in a variety of colors. In vases a number in assorted colors and gold decorations, including ebony and orchid are decidedly appealing. Among the newest things in deep acid etchings is a stemware line in medium optic with gold encrusted border. Another novelty is shown in gold stipple in white and vellow gold and in combination with ebony, jade, primrose, helio and azurite. In this line are numbered salad sets, flaring and cupped bowls, vases, handled baskets and candlesticks. The wine barrel, introduced to catch the tide for summer goods, is also one of the outstanding novelties. The imitation is a perfect replica of a cask, with hoops and the grain of the wood most cleverly imitated. These are obtainable in crystal and a variety of colors and also in satin finish.

Zoom & Tell August: Near Cut

The August Zoom & Tell program, led by Freeman Moore, focused on the topic of Near Cut. Near Cut refers to the heavy molded patterns produced by Cambridge to mimic the more expensive American brilliant cut glass designs being produced at the same time. Freeman informed guests the Cambridge Glass Company began using the term Near Cut in 1904 and received a patent for the name in 1905. The Near Cut era spanned approximately 18 years with the last usage of the term in 1922. Freeman explained that some items from the Near Cut era continued beyond 1922. One example he gave is the Wild Rose punch bowl.

Many items produced between 1904 and 1922 have the words Near Cut stamped into the glass, but not all pieces of Near Cut are marked. NCC reprinted multiple collector reference books detailing the glass produced during the Near Cut era. Cambridge produced many Near Cut lines, but not all lines are named. Ironically, some lines contain many pieces while other lines contain only a few pieces. The first named Near Cut line was Radium which was introduced in 1904. Some of the other named lines include: Plymouth, Marjorie, Ferland, Sunburst, Lotus, Dorothy, Feather, Ribbon, Star, Wheat Sheaf, Guernsey, Buzz Saw, La Touraine, Colonial, Daisy, Thistle, Strawberry, Community, Lexington and Gothic. Most Near Cut items are crystal, but Cambridge did produce some decorated and colored pieces. Some of the decorations included gold trim, gold highlights, ruby stain, carnival and enamel designs. Most colored and decorated pieces are difficult to find. After Freeman's program, guests of the Zoom & Tell shared many wonderful pieces from their collections.

The topic of reproductions surfaced during the Zoom & Tell program. Items in Strawberry and Thistle have been reproduced by multiple companies. Guernsey Glass, Mosser and Fenton have reproduced items in these lines. Paying attention to color and quality of glass can help with identifying reproductions, but each of these companies made or continue to make high quality glassware. Thus, determining reproductions can be difficult.

The October Zoom & Tell will be held on Tuesday, October 8 at 8:00 PM ET. The program will be led by Linda Roberts on the topic of perfumes, colognes and atomizers. Linda has been an avid collectors of Cambridge boudoir items for many years. Please check your cabinets for examples to share. This eBay Report is provided to keep members up with what's happening on the world's largest Internet Auction site, and focuses on Cambridge glass items that are seldom or rarely seen. Please note we cannot guarantee the accuracy of listings herein.

Welcome to the eBay Report, featuring Cambridge glass items that sold on eBay over the past month. Selling prices are rounded to the nearest dollar. If no color is mentioned, assume that the piece or part of it being discussed is crystal. If I refer to an auction as "incognito," that means that the seller did not know he or she was offering Cambridge glass, and didn't use the word "Cambridge" in the description. I also mention if a listing was a Buy It Now offering, as opposed to an auction style listing. I think it's important to distinguish between the two, as the price for an auctioned item reflects competitive bidding (or no competition, if it sells for the opening bid.) Here we go:

Rose Point:

A set of 6 tumblers, listed as #497 Sham Straight Sides Tumblers,

8 ounces, was listed for \$225.00 and sold for A best offer at \$202.50.

A salad bowl, Pristine, #426, 9" across, 3.75" tall, with sterling silver rope-style base, marked Wallace #4640, listed for \$135.00 and a Best Offer was accepted.



Instead of selling pieces separately, one dealer decided to go with the "box lot" approach consisting of 5 pieces. All pieces noted as perfect; consisting of:

- A relish, #3599/652, 12" celery, •
- A celery, 3500/64, 12", celery and relish dish, 4-toed, 2 handled, 3 compartment celery and relish dish,

- A bowl, #3400/4, 4-toed flared, 12",
- A 2 handled cake plate, #3900/35, 13 ¹/₂" wide,
- A 2 handled low footed plate, 3500/161, 8" wide

Sold for the listed price of \$150.00 for all five pieces.





A rare La Rosa pink 35 ounce decanter #187 and 5 tumblers were listed for \$1,125.00 and sold for an Undisclosed

Best Offer. The tumbler size was not listed, but a 7 piece set was originally offered by Cambridge Glass Company with the #187 decanter and six #188 2 ounce tumblers.

A set of 8 Caprice salt dips, listed as footed Yellow Vaseline, .88 x1.5", in excellent condition was listed



for \$99.00 and sold for an Undisclosed Best Offer. These are #95 4 footed Almonds, and there is no documentation that Cambridge made these in Topaz. Guernsey Glass and Summit Art Glass both produced this piece after Cambridge Glass Company closed.

A Late Dark Emerald 4 footed crimped bowl, # 66, 12 $\frac{3}{4}$ " x 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ " and 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ " tall, noted as rare and in

excellent condition was listed for \$195.00 sold for a Best Offer of \$87.75.



A pair of #1338 triple candlesticks in Moonlight Blue, 6" tall, with sterling overlay berries, noted in excellent



condition was listed for \$85.00 and an Undisclosed Best Offer was accepted.

A bud vase, 10" tall, #274, in Ebony, etched Blossom Time, and gold encrusted, sold for \$149.95.

A rare Buddha flower frog figure, #520, 9" tall, in Light Emerald Green, was sold at \$1,324.00 with 3 bids. Some roughness on the base of the frog was noted.



Elegant Etches:

A #935 64 ounce jug in Pink with the Imperial Hunt etch was listed at \$188.88 and sold for an Undisclosed Best Offer. This jug was offered with either a rounded handle or a squared handle.

A set of five gorgeous Willow Blue #3130 goblets; etched Apple Blossom; 8 ounce, 7 ¹/₂" tall, sold for \$199.99.

To go with the goblets, the same dealer had a single gorgeous Willow Blue #3130 tall sherbet; etched Apple Blossom; 5 5/8" tall, which sold for \$25.00.







A pair of #3400/646 Willow Blue single candle holders, etched Apple Blossom sold for \$69.99.

A rare large hat vase, #1701, 9", etched Blossom Time, sold for \$499.99.




A Rare Light Emerald #3400 handled server tray, 12 x 12", 6" with the Rosalie etching, sold for \$249.95. This is an unusual large size.

Membership Corner

Member Spotlight: Tim & Nancy Crose

Our glass collecting journey started shortly after we were married in 1976. Tim and his Dad collected arrow heads which were found while working fields during planting and harvest season, and also as they walked and/or rode a motorcycle through the pastures and creeks while checking on cattle. Tim's Mom collected pieces of Akro Agate child dishes, his Uncle Zelton was a stamp collector\dealer and Aunt Ree collected post cards. I soon wanted to collect something but didn't know what. During one of our outings we stopped at an antique store on the outskirts of Keokuk, Iowa, and while I was speaking with the owner and expressed my desire to collect something but wasn't sure what. She walked me over to a display and picked up a little blue tumbler and said "Here this was manufactured by the Cambridge Glass Company in Cambridge, Ohio, the pattern is Caprice and the color is Moonlight Blue, you can't go wrong and it will hold it's value". It was the only piece of Cambridge Glass there.

And so our hunt and addiction began in 1981. Unfortunately, where we reside Cambridge glass is next to obsolete. On one particular occasion Tim noticed an estate auction advertisement to be held in Macomb, Illinois, which listed "Cambridge Glass". We decided to attend the auction and low and behold the Cambridge Glass happened to be various pieces of Caprice Moonlight Blue. We were overjoyed to be able to purchase various pieces to add to our collection.

For many years over Labor Day weekend a flea market is held in Colchester, Illinois. During our stroll through the flea market we met exhibitors Robert and Mary Dilts who had pieces of Caprice "in colors". We were in awe. In the following years, Robert and Mary would mention we needed to go to Cambridge, Ohio, to the museum. Finally, we had the opportunity to go to Zanesville, Ohio in 2014 to purchase an estate car, and noticed Cambridge, Ohio, was just a short jaunt away. It was like being in a candy store. Never imagined the patterns, etchings, colors and the various pieces. Definitely eye opening. I believe it was at this time we purchased a book on Cambridge Glass which helped us to identify the various pieces.

Then eBay opened our world to the opportunity to purchase Cambridge Glass as well as becoming members of National Cambridge Collectors, attending the annual auction and convention time. As our opportunities have opened so has our interest in other patterns especially Everglade and Near Cut. I foresee more glass cabinets in the future.

It has been an amazing adventure! Keep the desire to collect burning! ■


